

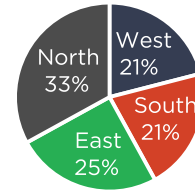
BEST PRACTICES FOR PIE CHARTS

A quick guide to help keep your pie charts honest and easy to consume

1

A pie chart displays the percent or proportion of total for each category.

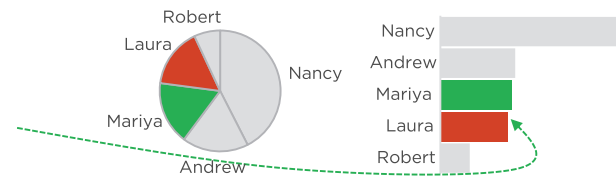
All slices should add up to 100%.



2

It's difficult to compare the size of the triangular slices.

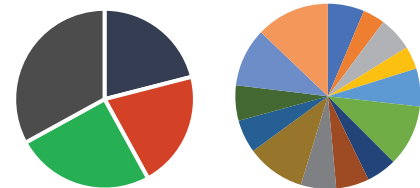
Use a bar/column chart when the data has **small variances** between categories.

Keep the number of slices to a minimum.

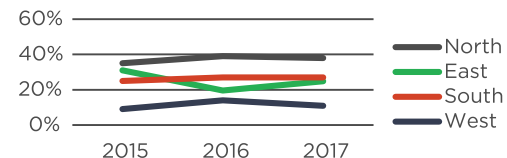
Usually 4-6 slices max. Too many slices makes the chart **difficult to read**.

Don't use multiple pie charts to make comparisons over time.

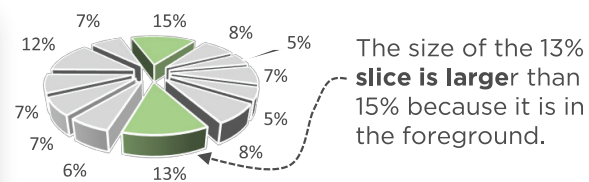
Line charts can be a good alternative.

Don't use 3D pie charts, ever.

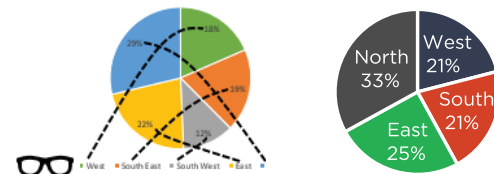
The size of the slices is deceiving. Chart does not accurately represent the data.

Avoid the Legend

This makes the chart slower to read. Add category labels on/outside the chart instead.



7

Use pie charts sparingly, when the data meets the rules above.

Do your best to educate your boss & audience about the principles of data visualization, but don't get too upset when their demand for pie charts wins.
